Program Guidelines

It is your responsibility to understand all Certificate of Intercultural Engagement program guidelines. The CIE coordinator is available to address any questions and/or concerns.

Canvas

1) Enrollment in GIS 099

Participation in the CIE program is tracked through official enrollment in the GIS 099 course on Canvas. This is a non-credit-bearing course that students will automatically be enrolled in upon applying to the CIE program. This course is where students will upload projects, keep track of the program requirements, and receive communication from the Coordinator.

2) Program completion via GIS 499

In their final semester at UT, students must **self-enroll** in the GIS 499 course to complete the CIE program. This course adopts a S (Satisfactory) or U (Unsatisfactory) grading system. It is where students will upload all required documentation showing completion of program requirements. Receipt of an 'S' grade in the course is required in order to receive the CIE notation on the official transcript along with sash and cords at graduation.

Course Objectives

1. To identify global skills, knowledge and attitudes that will help shape future decision-making and problem-solving
2. To discover how to put into practice the acquired global skills, knowledge, and attitudes acquired and learned throughout the CIE program
3. To relate your discipline skill set to a variety of international settings
4. To articulate your point-of-view on a particular global issue(s) and demonstrate the ability to access information about the world
5. To prepare undergraduate CIE students to succeed in the workplace
6. To express a more explicit understanding of yourself to potential employers that includes: skills, abilities, interests, and your ability to positively impact workplace dynamics
7. To recognize global career options in various disciplines (e.g. money and banking, biology, government/world affairs, entrepreneurship, etc.)

Grading

While GIS 099 is a non-credit-bearing course, students must receive a grade of Satisfactory (Satisfactory) on each Global Engagement Activity assignment in order to be able to register for GIS 499 in their final semester. In their final semester of study at UT, students will receive a grade of U (Unsatisfactory) or S (Satisfactory) in the GIS 499 course based on whether all requirements of the CIE have been met.

Program Requirements

- Two intercultural essays, one due during the first semester of the program and one due at the end of the program while
- Completion of the IDI. Pre-test to take place during the first semester of the program; post-test to take place while enrolled in GIS 499
- Four semesters (16 credits) of foreign language, as well as completion of the ACTFL oral language proficiency interview
- Global knowledge courses (4-16 credits)
- An approved education abroad experience
- 5 global engagement activities with related assignments

Course requirements can be counted if completed before entry to the program. For example, if you took World Music before you applied to the CIE program, it would be counted as one of your global knowledge courses. Likewise, approved courses taken while studying abroad can also be counted for the certificate program requirements.

All assignments submitted for grading need to follow this specific naming convention:

8. To illustrate anecdotal global experiences from the CIE program and show how they increased self-esteem and intercultural sensitivity and awareness
9. To support career goals and develop a career strategy incorporating the skills, knowledge and values/attitudes gained throughout the CIE program

All of your work must be professionally presented. You will be graded down for grammatical, spelling, or other technical errors. You should turn in your work as you would to your professor. This means that your name and title of the assignment are specified on the cover sheet or front page.

You are expected to turn in all assignments on time. Late papers or assignments and assignments that do not meet minimum standards will not be accepted. Failure to complete a major assignment on time or failure to meet minimum standards will result in receipt of a grade of Unsatisfactory on the assignment. This may impact a student's ability to continue in the program.

Intercultural Essay Requirement

Students are required to submit two intercultural essays for successful completion of the CIE program. The first essay, Intercultural-PRE is completed in the first semester of entry into the CIE. Graduating seniors are required to submit a second essay in their final year of study at UT on the subject of intercultural competence, which is the Intercultural-POST.

These assignments are set up on Canvas with instructions and are open for submission of your essay.

Instructions for the intercultural essays (PRE and POST)

Please answer the following question:

1. What does intercultural competence mean to you today?
2. How do you view the importance of intercultural competence in the U.S. today?
3. **PRE:** What do you hope to gain from the CIE program?

POST: What did you gain from the CIE program?

Format:

- 1.5-2 pages
- Times New Roman, 12 pt. font
- Double spaced
- 1 in margins

How will the essay be graded?

Both the pre and post intercultural essays will be graded by the professor using the following rubric:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the uniqueness of cultures (geographical, religious, socio-cultural characteristics)
2. Demonstrate knowledge/appreciation of the historical context of various world cultures
3. Develop knowledge and appreciation of the contemporary global agenda
4. Demonstrate recognition and appreciation of cultural differences
5. Demonstrate self-awareness & develop self-esteem regarding their own culture and its ethnic diversity.
6. Demonstrate receptivity and openness to learning about the world
7. Readability & Organization

Intercultural Development Inventory

Students are required to take the Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) twice; once during the first semester in the program and again during the last semester at UT. Note that the assessment is used as a tool to provide students with a development plan to increase intercultural competence. It is also used to measure intercultural development progress during the program. The inventory scores are not used to calculate grades for the program.

The IDI is now conducted online. Students will receive an email with instructions and a code to be able to initiate the test from any location with an internet location. The test takes approximately 35 minutes.

The Intercultural Development Inventory® (IDI®) is a statistically reliable, cross-culturally valid measure of intercultural competence adapted from the Developmental Model of Intercultural Sensitivity.

The IDI is a 50-item, theory-based instrument that is conducted online. The instrument is easy to complete and it can generate an in-depth graphic profile of an individual's or groups' predominant level of intercultural competence along with a detailed textual interpretation of that level of intercultural development and associated transitional issues. How is the IDI measured?

The IDI takes the participant's results and places the individual's orientation on the appropriate axis of the intercultural competence continuum.

The main categories of the continuum:

Denial: recognizes more observable cultural difference but may not notice deeper cultural differences and may avoid differences

Polarization: views cultural difference in terms of "us" and "them"

Minimization: highlights cultural commonality and universal values

Acceptance: recognizes and appreciates patterns of cultural difference

Adaptation: capable of shifting cultural perspective and changing behavior in culturally appropriate and authentic ways

Foreign Language Requirement

If you are a native English speaker:

Students need to complete at least FOUR semesters of non-native foreign language coursework (16 credit hours) in **one** language area (French, Italian or Spanish) with a minimum GPA of 2.75. The coursework must appear on your UT transcript, as either transfer credit or UT credit.

Students should attempt to demonstrate proficiency in a foreign language by attaining the intermediate level on the Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) administered by the American Council of Teaching Foreign Languages (ACTFL). Taking four semesters of a foreign language will certainly prepare students for this goal.

If you are a non-native English speaker:

Non-native English speakers, while not required to take the ACTFL OPI, are nevertheless required to complete 16 credits hours of foreign language study in **one** language area (French, Italian or Spanish) to fulfill the requirements of the CIE.

How to Register for the OPI:

Students will register with Dr. Vanessa Rukholm at vrukholm@ut.edu. Tests requests must come **at least two weeks** in advance and students must provide at least two dates that they would be available for testing.

What is the OPI?

The OPI is the Oral Proficiency Interview conducted by ACTFL, the top organization for teaching and testing language aptitude. Students should plan to take the OPI by the 9th week of their global capstone course, at the latest. Students may take it earlier if they wish. It is recommended that students complete the OPI when they feel the most confident in their language ability, such as after completing their final language class or after returning from a study abroad experience.

The OPI is a telephonic interview between a certified ACTFL tester and an examinee that determines how well a person speaks a language by comparing his or her performance of specific communication tasks with the criteria for each of ten proficiency levels. The ten proficiency levels are: Novice-low, mid, high Intermediate-low, mid, high advanced-low, mid, high superior

Results of the OPI are sent to the CIE Coordinator and reported to students via email and Canvas approximately 1-2 weeks after completion.

Global Knowledge Course Requirement

To better understand the world, students need to complete a number of Global Knowledge Courses (4-16 credit hours depending on Major) from a wide array of global knowledge courses. These credit hours may also count toward a major, minor, baccalaureate, and other graduation requirements. All of the courses designated in the UT catalog as IG or NW may fulfill this requirement. However, more classes may also satisfy this requirement. Please check with the CIE coordinator if you have a question about a specific class fulfilling the global knowledge component.

Education Abroad Requirement

At least one education abroad experience is required and must be approved by the CIE Coordinator prior to departure. The experience **must** take place in a country where the target language the CIE student is studying is spoken. For more information please visit Dr. Vanessa Rukholm in Plant Hall #311C.

Students may choose to participate in one of the following:

UT Travel Course: Earn UT academic credit and travel abroad with UT classmates and faculty. Students enroll in an on-campus course with a travel component. The travel component may last from seven days to four weeks. Students pay regular tuition for a 3-4 credit hour course plus travel costs. Students typically receive academic credit in the same semester as the pre-departure course.

International Internship: Gain valuable career experience in the global workplace. In addition to résumé building opportunities, students may also receive UT academic credit for an international internship.

Semester/Year Abroad: Study at a foreign institution and take classes in a variety of disciplines including business, communication, history, science, psychology, and foreign language, just to name a few. UT students take courses in English and/or in the language of the host country. An education abroad advisor will work with students to have courses evaluated for transfer credit. Costs vary according to destination, length of stay, and type of program. Application deadlines are March 1 for the summer and fall semesters and October 1 for the spring semester.

Community-Based Service Learning: Combine volunteer service and travel abroad to benefit communities outside the United States. Students receive a notation on their Co-curricular

Students studying abroad are still required to complete a global engagement inventory each semester in the program.

Global Engagement Activities

While at UT, students should demonstrate intercultural leadership and engagement by completing Global Engagement activities throughout their progress through the CIE program. Students should always check with the CIE Coordinator prior to participating in any activity for the CIE to ensure that it counts towards the Certificate's requirements.

Global Engagement Activities Guidelines

- Students in the certificate program must complete global engagement activities and projects during the program according to the requirements below
- Students must complete at least one project per activity (see table below) and will submit them to the e-portfolio on Canvas in GIS 099
- To earn credit for each project, students must submit them by the stated deadline and receive an S (Satisfactory) or U (Unsatisfactory) on the project
- All activities should be recorded in the e-portfolio on Canvas.

Global Engagement Activities Requirements

- A total of **five (5)** activities must be completed
- At least one activity must be completed from **each** of the three categories (A,B, and C) (see table below)
